

KEYNOTE LECTURE

GEOECONOMICS, ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY, AND THE RISE OF AMERICAN GLOBAL POWER IN THE EARLY 20TH CENTURY

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Professor Mona Domosh is a cultural-historical geographer with research interests in four main areas:

1) exploring the cultural-historical geographies of the making of American empires; 2) examining in what ways ideas of femininity, masculinity, consumption, and "whiteness" played into the crucial shift from American nation-building to empire-building during the late 19th and early 20th centuries; 3) understanding the connections between gender, class and the cultural formation of large American cities in the 19th century, and 4) exploring feminist perspectives, theory, and methodology in relationship to matters of space and place.

Mona Domosh finished her PhD. at the Clark University and now is the professor at the Dartmouth College. She is also former President of the American Association of Geographers (2014-2015). Her publications include dozens of scientific articles and books, namely Putting Women in Place: Feminist Geographers Make Sense of the World (2001), Handbook of Cultural Geography (2002) or Contemporary Human Geography: Culture, Globalization, Landscape (2014), and others.

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
