INSTRUCTIONS FOR PRESENTERS AND CHAIRS

Language: The conference is held in English.

Paper presenters have to arrive at the appropriate room five minutes before the session is due to start; upload their presentations onto the PC (LCD projector and PC with MS Powerpoint will be available) and introduce themselves to other presenters and the chair. There will be at least 15 minutes reserved for every individual presentation in each session and 5 minutes for discussion after each presentation.

Session chairs have to be very strict in terms of time management so that each presenter has an equal amount of time. The chair must ensure there will be at least 15 minutes reserved for every individual presentation and 5 minutes for discussion after each presentation. The session chair will help participants with time management using cards indicating that presenter's time allocation is coming to an end. The chair should also introduce all presenters and lead discussion during all the session.

Poster presenters: The poster should not be larger than A1 (60 x 85 cm) format. The organizers strongly encourage presenters to display their posters at the beginning of the conference and let them be displayed during the whole conference. The poster session will be organized as an exhibition without individual presentations. The authors are required to be present at their posters during the whole poster session in order to answer questions to other participants.
